www.rootsweb.com, one of the oldest sites

www.usgenweb.org, every state has a site here. Operated by volunteers

Part Two: Entering your data onto your computer using genealogy software

<u>www.familysearch.org</u>, has some very good <u>free</u> software <u>www.familytreemaker.com</u> sells software and disks with all kinds of information on them

Finally, if you are serious about researching your roots, you should join the Genealogical Society of Weld County (http://www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~cowcgs/) which meets the first Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. At the Centennial Park Library located on 23rd Avenue next to the fire station, slightly north of Reservoir Road. There is a wealth of information located in the library and volunteers who an help you get started. Also the LDS church on West 4th Street has a modest collection of material but can borrow much from the LDS Family History Center in Salt Lake City (http://www.familysearch.org/eng/Library/FHC/frameset_fhc.asp). However, not everything at the Library can be borrowed.

Finally, finally, you must plan on spending several days at the Family History Center in Salt Lake City, at least three days. Located there is the largest collection of genealogy information in the world. Check their web site on planning your trip there. My wife Joan and I have made three trips to the Family History Center in Salt Lake City.
